President's Message

Compatriots,

We will soon begin celebrating "Virginia's Road to Independence." This is the 2025 Virginia SAR presidential initiative celebrating the Commonwealth of Virginia's military actions in expelling Lord Dunmore from the colony. There are six events: 1) The May 1775 armed response to the April 1775 Williamsburg powder magazine incident, 2) the October 1775 skirmish at Hampton, 3) the November 1775 skirmish at Kemp's Landing, 4) the December 1775 battle of Great Bridge, 5) the January 1776 burning of Norfolk and 5) the July 1776 battle of Gwynn's Island (also known as the battle of Cricket Hill). More information will be forthcoming, and you are welcome to attend them.

Compatriots Stuart Butler, Gary Dunaway, Steve Holm, Bruce Laubach, John Lynch, Steve McGuffin, and Ron Miller were present at the March 16, 2025 celebration of Patrick Henry's "Give Me Liberty" speech at St. John's Church in Richmond, Virginia. This event was sponsored by Richmond Chapter, Virginia SAR and they did a magnificent job with it. Gary, Ron and I participated in the celebration's color guard.

The judging of the annual brochure contest for 6th and 7th graders is complete. We are now in the process of notifying the winners. I was one of the judges and I was impressed with the quality of many of the submissions. Many thanks to Bruce Laubach for his management of this program.

The Board of Managers recently authorized 500 dollars to be donated to Colonial Williamsburg Foundation's Teacher Institute. The Institute brings history teachers from around the country to participate in a residential program offering various pertinent workshops. This is an exceptional program. 

Topic: Washington's Decision to Decline a Third Term

April 12, 2025 Meeting Speaker: Dr. David A. Yalof

David A. Yalof is the Vice Provost for Academic Affairs (and Professor of Government) at William & Mary. In this role he serves as the chief advisor to the Provost and provides leadership and oversight of academic programs, curriculum, program planning and compliance.

Nearly four decades ago, Dr. Yalof received his B.A. (1988) and J.D. (1991) at the University of Virginia. He then practiced law at Jones Day Reavis & Pogue in Washington, D.C., just prior to earning his doctorate at the Johns Hopkins University in 1997. Before joining William & Mary in 2023, Dr. Yalof was Department Head and Professor of Political Science at the University of Connecticut, a position he held for a decade. His first book, Pursuit of Justices: Presidential Politics and the Selection of Supreme Court Nominees, won the 1999 Richard E. Neustadt Award as the best book on the presidency from the American Political Science Association. More recently, he authored George Washington and the Two-Term Precedent (2023) and Prosecution among Friends: Presidents, Attorneys General, and Executive Branch Wrongdoing. (2012)

Revolutionary War History Fact of the Month


AN EARLY AMERICAN NAVAL VICTORY IN APRIL 1776 (Submitted by Stuart Butler, Chapter Historian)

The Continental Brig, *Lexington*, commanded by Capt. John Barry, left Philadelphia on March 26, 1776, to begin a year and half of challenging British ships in the North Atlantic. Barry, born in Ireland in 1745, settled in the Philadelphia area and offered his naval experiences to the Second Continental Congress soon after hostilities broke out. Congress promptly appointed him captain, the first such commission in the fledgling American navy.

Lexington was first purchased by Maryland state officials in St. Eustatius, Dutch West Indies, and sailed under the name Wild Duck bringing in badly needed gunpowder to Philadelphia. The ship was purchased by the Continental Marine Committee and renamed Lexington after the battle in Massachusetts. The brig was 86 feet in length and 25 feet in breadth and carried fourteen four pounders and twelve swivels. On March 26, 1776, Lexington slipped down the Delaware River and eluded the British blockade on April 6. The next day, Lexington, off the Capes of Virginia, encountered the British tender, Edward, servicing the larger frigate, HMS Liverpool. After a short, but bloody fight lasting about an hour, Edward struck its colors and Lexington took her into Philadelphia as a prize of war. Later in the month on April 26, Lexington fell in with Sir Peter Parker's fleet then preparing to attack Charleston, South Carolina. Barry managed barely to escape, only to find himself pursued by two British frigates later in May off the Delaware River. He managed to escape his pursuers by sailing up the Delaware to Philadelphia.

Barry would go on to command five different warships and is considered by many to be the "Father of the American Navy" along with John Paul Jones. Barry died in 1803 and was buried in St. Mary's Church, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

James Monroe


As I was thinking about a subject for the April newsletter, my thoughts turned to our 5th president, James Monroe. I wrote a Chaplain's Corner several months ago on the Divine Hand that has guided mankind and events throughout history. As some of you know, James Monroe was in the Battle of Trenton as General Washington's patriot army crossed the Delaware River to seize the town of Trenton which was garrisoned by Hessian soldiers. Monroe led an advance force to capture enemy cannons so that the Hessians could not use them against the patriot army.

In this engagement, he was wounded with a severed artery and almost died from it. The quick treatment of the wound by a local doctor saved his life. It would not be too far-fetched to believe that the Divine Hand played a part in this event sparing the soldier who would become the 5th President of the United States of America.

During his administration (1817-1825) he gave us the Monroe Doctrine, presided over the Era of Good Feeling to name but a few. His life was filled with notable achievements at every turn throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia and this great nation. This month, we honor him with ceremonies both at the replica birthplace home near Colonial Beach, Virginia and at his gravesite in Hollywood Cemetery, Richmond, Virginia. Let us never forget this great American.

Heavenly Father, we seek thy blessings upon this nation that You have so richly blessed and provided to us. We remember our Patriot Ancestors who with Your divine help, sacrificed their lives and fortunes so that their prodigy could inherit freedom and an opportunity for Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness. 

Book of the Month – By Stephen Holm, Sergeant-at-Arms





The Invasion of Virginia – 1781

Hardback (New), - 2017, 179 pages,

By the sixth year of the American Revolution, Britain had determined that Virginia would be the key to subduing the entire rebellion. Following the battle at Monmouth Courthouse, New Jersey, in 1778, British strategy moved to the South, where their armies clashed with Continental troops in Georgia and South Carolina. Surprisingly, Virginia saw little fighting up to this point in the war. This changed suddenly in 1781, when the turncoat Benedict Arnold led 1,600 seasoned British troops on a successful raid up the James River to Richmond, destroying Patriot property along the way. Arnold's bold stroke demonstrated Virginia's vulnerability to attack and the possibility that the colonies could be divided and subdued piecemeal. British General Henry Clinton decided to reinforce Arnold in Virginia, while events in North Carolina, including the battle of Guilford Courthouse, convinced British General Charles Cornwallis that defeating the Patriots in Virginia was the key to ending the war. As historian Michael Cecere relates in "The Invasion of Virginia - 1781", the war's arrival in the largest colony had unintended consequences for Cornwallis and his powerful British force.

Maps, a bibliography, detailed reference notes (by chapter) and an index to full-names, places and subjects add to the value of this work.
