Compatriots,

Welcome to the start of our Chapter's active season; indeed 2024 promises to be very busy. In addition to our usual meetings and commemorations we will: 1) Host SAR's Atlantic Middle States Association (AMSA) in August 2) Host VASSAR's Semi-Annual Conference in September 3) Engage with and develop activities for America's 250th Anniversary of the Revolutionary War, 4) Support the Bicentennial of Lafayette's 1824-1825 Farewell Tour (he visited the Battle of Green Spring site on 22 October 1824) and 5) Establish new Chapter events. You have the opportunity to impact what we do.

We are also looking for your feedback as to what activities/practices we should start, which ones we should stop, and which ones we should continue. Please send your thoughts by 29 February 2024 to Gary Dunaway (ormazd72@gmail) for collation and anonymization. The Board of Managers will review the responses in March. Williamsburg Chapter's membership roster for December 2023 listed 186 compatriots. Ten percent of our Chapter members live out of state. We have members in California, Florida, Georgia, Massachusetts, Nebraska, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Tennessee, and Texas. About a quarter of our Virginia-based compatriots live more than 30 minutes away from Williamsburg. Approximately 66 percent of our Virginia-based members live within a roughly 20-minute drive to our usual meeting place in Colonial Heritage. Some of our 2024-chapter initiatives (detailed in this edition of The Magazine) allow for remote engagement; examples potentially include Patriot research, proof reading manuscripts, liaison work with SAR, DAR, and/or CAR chapters, contact with local historical societies, etc. Please let me know if you are interested in these (or other) activities.

Compatriots near and far: because of you, our Chapter has high potential this year to achieve our Chapter's objectives. I look forward to working with you in support of the SAR mission.

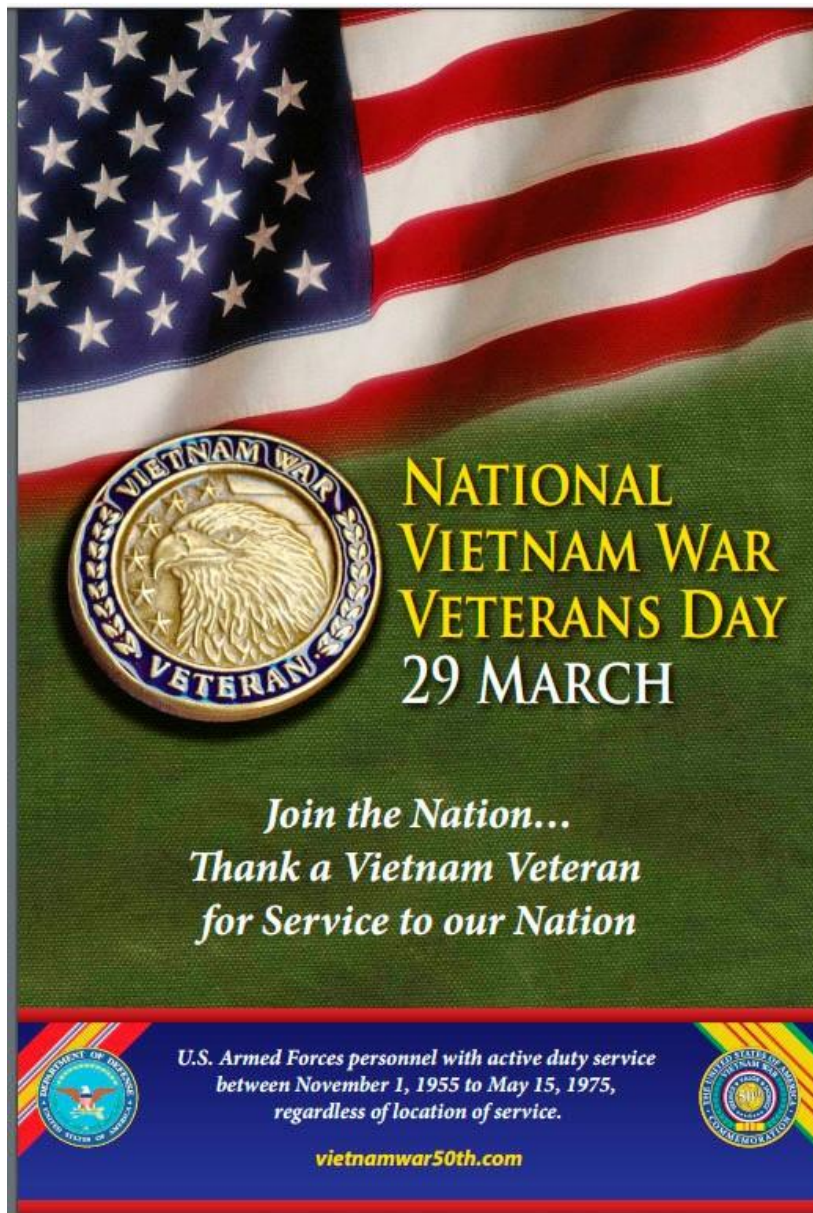

Tidewater Virginia Patriot of the Month: Col. Samuel Griffin

A native of Richmond County, Virginia, Samuel Griffin (1746- 1810) also had deep roots in Williamsburg. Born into privilege, Griffin studied classics and law, was admitted to the Virginia bar, and worked as a lawyer. He is best known, however, for his role as a Continental Army colonel during the Revolutionary War. Serving as aide-de-camp to Maj. Gen. Charles Lee, Griffin helped change the course of the war in 1776 when he led several hundred militia and Virginia regulars into Mount Holly, New Jersey, to distract enemy troops. His action allowed General George Washington to cross the Delaware River, which led to the Continental Army's first major victory at the Battle of Trenton. He served as mayor of Williamsburg (1779-1780) and as a Federalist, Griffin represented Williamsburg in the Virginia Assembly (1786–88) before Virginians elected him to the First Federal Congress in 1789. He was reelected to Congress twice more but declined to run again in 1796 (Smithsonian and *Wikipedia*).

2nd New Hampshire Regimental Flag

This flag was first raised under the command of Brigadier General Enoch Poor in 1775. The gold interlaced rings bear the name of the 13 colonies, symbolizing the strength, power, and unity of the new nation. Inside the sunburst, one of the earliest Union mottos declares, "WE ARE ONE."

The flag's striking design also appears on the Fugio Cent, the first coin authorized by the Continental Congress in 1787. The national copper cent was how Congress combated the growing number of counterfeit coins in circulation.

Designed by Benjamin Franklin, the coin was likely based on the 1776 Continental Dollar Coin, which was never circulated. The coin's front side features the word Fugio, which is Latin for "I fly," with a sundial and the phrase, "Mind Your Business" underneath. The bold statement has been purported as Franklin's way of warning the British to stay away. The back of the coin features the same imagery as the Second New Hampshire Regiment Flag. The interlocking circles of each colony represent their individual identities as part of a larger and stronger alliance. Together, the thirteen colonies indicated "we are one" against the Crown.



Did You Know???

At no time did more than 45 percent of colonists support the war, and at least a third of colonists fought for the British.

Unlike the Civil War, which pitted regions against each other, the war of independence pitted neighbor against neighbor. Americans were not only rebelling against the mother country, but they were also fighting each other. (Source: University of Rochester).

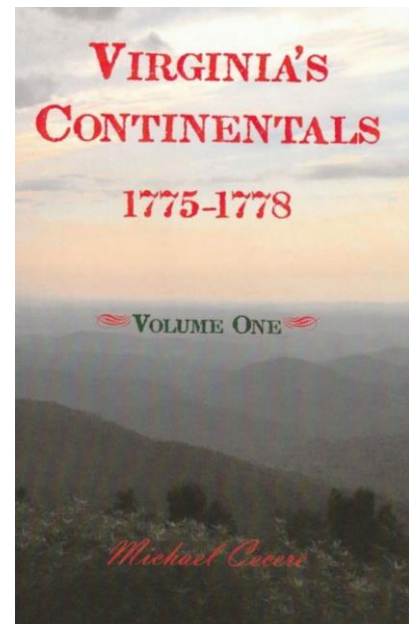

Revolutionary War Books Review – By Stephen Holm, Sergeant-at-Arms



Virginia's Continentals, 1775-1778, Volume One

Paperback (New), – June 8, 2022, 342 pages, signed by the author by Michael Cecere, One of our recent Chapter Speakers.

When the Revolutionary War erupted in Massachusetts in April 1775, no American army existed. Each colony had its own militia that required inhabitants, typically free men between the ages of sixteen to fifty years old, to defend the colony when needed. Few colonists imagined prior to 1775 that such colonial militia would be pitted against the professional regulars of the British army, but that is precisely what occurred as a result of the bloodshed at Lexington and Concord.

Within two months of the start of the war, the Continental Congress moved to strengthen the colonies by creating a Continental Army under General George Washington of Virginia. Aside from providing a commander-in-chief for this new, regular army of American troops (who were to serve until the end of the year), Virginia initially supplied just two companies of riflemen to the continental army. This soon changed, however, as both Congress and Virginia realized the need for vastly more continental soldiers. By the end of 1775, Congress called upon Virginia to supply six continental regiments of over 700 officers and men each to the Continental Army. Within another year, that number more than doubled to sixteen regiments and also included two regiments of light dragoons (cavalry) and one regiment of artillery.

This book explores the formation and service of Virginia's continental troops during the first several years of the Revolutionary War. Readers will discover that Virginia continentals played a pivotal role in a number of important battles including Trenton, Princeton, Brandywine, Germantown, and Saratoga. Maps, a bibliography, and an index to full-names, places and subjects add to the value of this work. I personally own this book and found it very interesting and informative. I also plan to raffle Volume Two, published in 2023, which Covers 1778 to 1783 (end of the war) during the March Chapter Luncheon.

- Remote work is popular for many people in today's workforce. Remote work is also applicable to some of our chapter's activities. Over a third of our chapter members in 2023 lived greater than thirty minutes away from Williamsburg. The geographical separation makes it hard or impossible to attend chapter meetings thus potentially leading to compatriot disengagement. This year we have two chapter projects which will provide us the opportunity to participate in important SAR activities from our homes.
- The major project is to establish a driving tour of the 1781 Virginia Campaign leading up to the 6 July 1781 Battle of Green Spring. The idea is to start in Orange County, Virginia where Lafayette's army and General Anthony Wayne's Pennsylvanian Continentals united. Then, from there, identify locations where significant or interesting local or regional events occurred up through the immediate aftermath of the Green Spring battle. Local knowledge held by chapter compatriots will be important in developing the tour. A related opportunity is identifying Virginians who participated in the battles of Green Spring and Spencer's Ordinary (27 June 1781). We've identified over 90 such men using 1833 pension statements found on-line; we need to ensure that they have biographies and are listed in the SAR patriot database.
- A second project is identifying physicians who served in Virginia forces during the Revolutionary War. Ninety-eight doctors were identified by searching 1833 pension statements and other sources found on-line. Nearly half (48.9%) of these men are forgotten (i.e. not found in the SAR and DAR databases).
- According to the NSSAR website, SAR's "Historic Goals" include commemorating and providing memorials for the people and events of the American Revolution as well as providing genealogical research and publications. SAR published the names and grave locations for 140,000 patriots and the "...Patriot Index Committee is publishing information on 732000 patriots and their descendants." In December 2023 your chapter identified Dr. Anthony Tucker Dixon (a forgotten patriot), produced a biography, and added him to the SAR database.
- We hope you choose to participate in these efforts. Your work and your ideas will be appreciated.
