President's Message

Compatriots,

Last month we presented four new Eagle Scouts with their SAR Eagle Scout Certificates and scholarship packages. The recipients were Grace Berquist (Troop 20), Thomas Berquist (Troop103), Samuel Geesaman (Troop 103), and John J. Hitt (Troop 1607). Ron Adolphi, Harley Stewart, and I attended the Troop 20 and Troop 103 ceremonies. Harley attended the Troop 1607 Eagle Charge ceremony and presented Scout Hitt with his certificate and scholarship package. Also on the Scouting front: the first-place winner of our Chapter's Eagle Scout contest was Ryan Dereix (Troop 414) with the second place prize going to Delaney Robbins (Troop 20). Scout Dereix's submission was sent to VASSAR for judging; he took first place at the state level and will receive his award during the 7-8 February VASSAR Annual Conference in Glen Allen.

The 1781 Skirmish at Charles City Courthouse commemorative event scheduled for 11 January 2025 was postponed to 1 February 2025 because of foul weather. Recently I received SAR documents and a Williamsburg Chapter Roster for the year 2007. The roster showed 86 compatriots in our chapter; 77 of them were living in Virginia and eight others were living out of state and scattered over seven states. 2023 data had 182 members with 161 of them in Virginia and 21 members living outside of Virginia in 11 states. Lastly, the 2024 figures showed 182 compatriots with 160 living in Virginia and 22 out of state compatriots living in12 states. We've grown! We certainly grew our commemorative events in 2024 and set the stage for others in 2025 and beyond. In 2025 we will consolidate these gains. We will also focus upon our educational efforts, our support to veterans, and our membership. Be on the lookout for a change in the luncheon venue, a relaxed dress code during the warmer months, family events (barbeque cookouts, pizza parlor dinners) and some field trips. Bob Davis has been working hard on developing a Williamsburg Chapter polo shirt. Your board of managers appreciates feedback and ideas from chapter membership. Tidewater Virginia Patriot of the Month

Brig. Gen. Jethro Sumner (ca. 1733-1785) North Carolina Line – Continental Army

Jethro Sumner was born in 1733 in Nansemond County (modern-day Suffolk), Virginia, the son of Jethro Sumner and Margaret Sullivan. From 1755-1761, he served in the Virginia Militia; he was promoted to lieutenant in 1758, commanded Fort Bedford in 1760, and ended the French and Indian War as a captain. In 1764, he moved to Warren, North Carolina, where he married Mary Hurst, daughter of a wealthy planter, in 1765. They had three children. He soon opened a tavern and became involved in local politics, first as a justice of the peace in 1768, and then as the Warren County sheriff from 1772 to 1777.

Sumner was elected major in the Halifax district minutemen in 1775, and the following year became a colonel of the Third Battalion of North Carolina Continentals. He participated in the defense of Charleston in June 1776, and served under Washington at Brandywine, Germantown, and Valley Forge. In 1778, he suffered from an illness and returned home to recruit replacements for the Continental units. Sumner was made brigadier general by the Continental Congress in January 1779, and the following June, led a brigade in the Battle of Stono Ferry. In 1780, he joined the defense of North Carolina against Cornwallis' invasion and resigned in protest when General William Smallwood was given command of the state troops in October. General Nathanael Greene persuaded him to return to the field shortly thereafter, and he performed his most important service commanding a brigade that reinforced Greene at Eutaw Springs in September 1781. He retired in 1783, his health seriously impaired, and died two years later. (University of Michigan Library).

Valentine's Day


When most people think of 14 February, they think of Valentine's Day and their significant other. As a history buff and a proud compatriot to the Sons of the American Revolution, the date brings to mind a major event during our ancestor's quest for a free nation. On 14 February 1781, Major General Nathanael Greene's patriot army crossed the Dan River at what is now South Boston, VA ahead of the British forces chasing him led by Lieutenant General Lord Charles Cornwallis. After the staggering defeat at Cowpens, SC, Cornwallis vowed to destroy the patriot army. Greene, realizing that the army was no match for **Cornwallis' entire force retreated through North Carolina with the goal to cross** into Virginia and recruit additional men and provide his force with a muchneeded rest/recuperation. With the British force in hot pursuit, Greene sent a detachment ahead to the Dan River to gather up boats in preparation to cross the river. The patriot army reached the Dan River ahead of the British force and crossed the river taking all the boats with them. Cornwallis had stretched his supply lines dangerously and had to retreat. Greene was able to reequip the army and recruit new men. The aftermath of this event was the Battle of Guilford Courthouse and Cornwallis' move to Wilmington, NC and then to Yorktown, VA where victory would be won by a combine American and French army. So, when you think of Valentine's Day, you might want to also think about this major event in our American Revolution.

Most Gracious Father, we thank You for this Land of Freedom and all the blessings that You have bestowed upon it through the years. We are eternally grateful for Your Divine hand in the affairs of this nation. May we never forget the selfless sacrifices of our patriot ancestors. Let us seek to be ever mindful of Your grace and love for each of us, Your children. In Your Most Holy Name, Amen.

March to Independence: The American Revolution in the Southern Colonies, 1775-1776

In March to Independence: The American Revolution in the Southern Colonies, 1775–1776, historian Michael Cecere, consulting primary source documents, examines how Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia ended up supporting the colonies to the north, while East Florida remained within the British sphere. South Carolina, Georgia, and East Florida all retained their royal governors through the summer of 1775, and no military engagements occurred in any of the southern colonies in the six months following the battles in Massachusetts. The situation changed significantly in the fall, however, with armed clashes in Virginia and South Carolina; by early 1776 the war had spread to all of the southern colonies except East Florida. Although their march to independence did not follow the exact route as the colonies to the north, events in the South pulled the southern colonists in the same direction, culminating with a united Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. Maps and images, a bibliography, and an index to full-names, places and subjects add to the value of this work.
