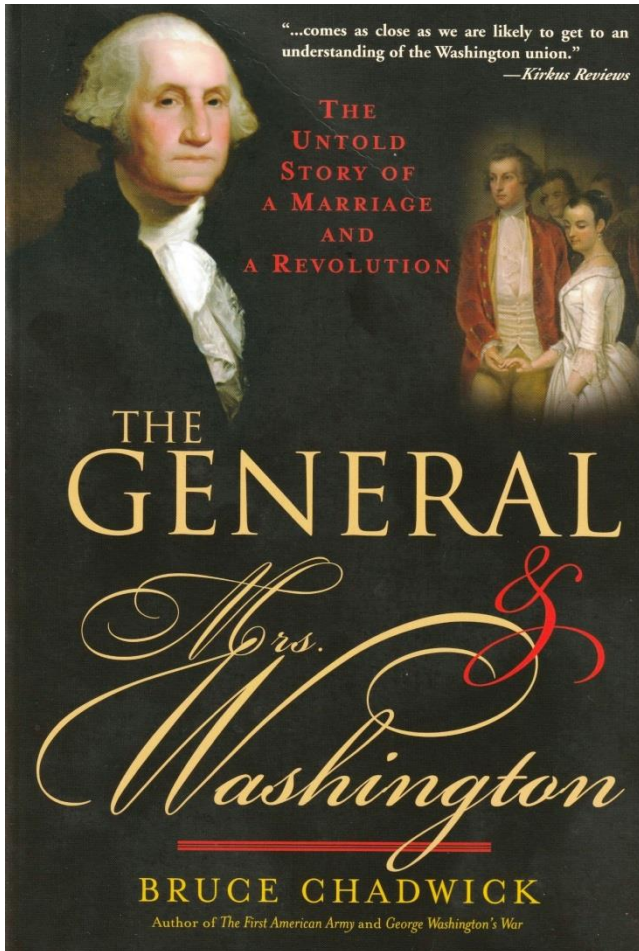

The General and Mrs. Washington: The Untold Story of a Marriage and a Revolution

Until now the story of the American Revolution has been incomplete. Many have told the stories of blood and battle, of heroes and traitors, but no one has told the tale of the union that helped form the Union. The history of America's First Family is inexorably tied to the workings of the revolution. Martha's son Jackie was 28 when he died at Yorktown. George's own life would have been lost on multiple occasions if not for Martha. Only she could bring comfort and grace to the winter camps and it was in this manner that the revolutionaries came to see Martha not only as a kindred spirit, but as a beloved heroine. Here is the story of the fateful marriage of the richest woman in Virginia and the man who could have been king. In telling their story, Chadwick explains not only their remarkable devotion to each other, but also why the wealthiest couple in Virginia became revolutionaries who risked the loss of not only their vast estates, but also their very lives.

Dr. William G. (Bill) Chrystal is an authority on the theologian and political philosopher Reinhold Niebuhr and his family. His books have been widely utilized by scholars and praised for their ground-breaking research. His latest book on the Niebuhr family is called *Niebuhr Studies*.

In addition, Bill is a leading scholar/performer of two Founding Fathers, John Adams and Alexander Hamilton. He is the author of *Hamilton by the Slice: Falling in Love with Our Most Influential Founding Father*.

Bill's present passion involves uncovering new material about Alexander Hamilton, someone he calls "a badly misunderstood founder." He is the Founding Editor of the *Alexander Hamilton Working Papers*, an occasional publication devoted to new research and information. In February 2012, Bill Chrystal was named the first National Alexander Hamilton Scholar by The Alexander Hamilton Awareness Society.

Sybil Ludington Was A 16 Year Old Girl Who Warned The American That The British Were Coming In 1777



Sybil Ludington rode nearly 40 miles overnight at only 16 years old, raising 400 men, and even fighting off a highway man with her father's musket to alert Americans that the British were coming. It was double the length of Paul Revere and she was personally thanked by General George Washington for her service.



June 14, 1775: The birth of the U.S. Army

The Army flag was dedicated and unfurled to the general public on 14 June 1956 at Independence Hall, Philadelphia, on the 181st anniversary of the establishment of the U.S. Army by the Continental Congress in 1775. Measuring 4 feet 4 inches by 5 feet 6 inches, the flag is of white silk with a blue embroidered central design of the original War Office seal. "United States Army" is inscribed in white letters on a scarlet scroll, with the year "1775" in blue numerals below. The Secretary of the Army designates the Army headquarters and agencies authorized an Army Flag.

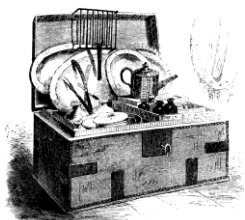
